
### Highlights from the Year

#### Giving Shelter Dogs a Second Chance

A great support for FOSAS and the animals in our charge is the Shelter Pet Obedience Program (SPOT) at the Spring Creek Correctional Facility in Seward, which accepts selected problem dogs from shelters to rehabilitate and train, with the objective of making them suitable for adoption by families in Alaska's communities. Fortunately for FOSAS (and the animals), SPOT generously accepted three shelter dogs whose future might otherwise have led to euthanasia.

Our most recent placement was Xoodzi, a lovely young Husky mix with some nipping history and dog reactivity, making her difficult to place with a Sitka family. While shelter volunteers cared for and walked her, FOSAS also sponsored her veterinary care, and then underwrote her trip to Anchorage. We are happy to report Xoodzi is doing well, paired with an inmate who provides her with a place to sleep, food, water, exercise, one-on-one training, and, most importantly, the love shared between them. Xoodzi also has made a best friend, Echo, another former Sitka Animal Shelter dog that is also going through the program. In no time we expect to hear that both Xoodzi and Echo have been adopted, joining the other Sitka Animal Shelter dog who has successfully graduated from the SPOT program!





#### Strumming for the Shelter

Members of the Sitka Ukulele group, known as Pointy and the Birds, were out this past summer "busking", while tourists flooded Lincoln Street. Did you happen to hear them? If you are not familiar with the term "busking" it is defined as: The activity of playing music in the street or another public place for voluntary donations. The Ukes brought lots of joy and fun to travelers and residents alike!

FOSAS was the sole recipient of the donations they collected this summer, which totaled just over \$6,000! This is the largest single donation FOSAS has received and we are so incredibly grateful. # Highlights from the Year

#### Teacher's Pets Grant

This last year has been one of renewal for the Sitka Animal Shelter on the wings of a generous grant from the Alaska Community Foundation and the combined work of volunteers, artists and students. The renovation began with the stripping bare of our Adult Cat Room, which at times has been home to as many as 15 cats. Once the room was temporarily vacated of cats, volunteer teams from Outer Coast College led by FOSAS volunteers Jim and Laura Rogers, worked in relays to remove all the cat fixtures and assorted toys, food and litter containers, and then deep clean, prime and paint the walls, while Jim and Laura prepared new moldings for doors and windows, and imagined, constructed and finished a new counter and sink with room below for new stainless litter boxes. which allows the full separation of litter from food servings.

The renovation was completed with a new cat-themed mural along three walls, and new climbing and hammock features that the cats occupied immediately! The Outer Coast team also renovated the outdoor dog kennel with donated weather-proof dog houses and easy-on-thepaws gravel. A second set of teams also stripped, primed and painted two other shelter spaces, one of which will soon be a visitation room for cats and potential adopters. Our regular volunteers were deeply involved in the whole program, which makes the spaces much more inviting for animals and visitors alike.

### **Success Stories**

Orion









On August 8th, Orion was trapped at a residence in Sitka and believed to be a feral kitten. The Sitka Animal Shelter picked up this little guy in the Orion's Sporting Goods parking lot, and was named on the spot. Orion was in rough shape on arrival at the shelter after living outside in unknown conditions. He had very goopy eyes and was underweight and quite scared. Our awesome volunteers made sure he had a warm, cozy place to sleep and once he settled in, Orion was certainly not a feral kitten. He welcomed human interaction with lots of purring and affection, showing his sweet side! After a couple weeks of one-on-one care and a vet visit to ensure he was gaining weight and staying healthy, Orion made a speedy recovery and won the hearts of many volunteers. He was one of those special kitties that you couldn't help but love. Not to mention, he had the sweetest and most unique features, including polydactyl paws, a short tail and crossed eyes. He was officially adopted on August 15th, one of the fastest turnarounds we've ever seen! Orion now lives in Gustavus, Alaska where he gets loved and spoiled by his family.

Maggie was surrendered to the shelter because she wasn't getting along with the other cat in her home, despite the owners trying everything they could to make it work. She spent some time in and out of a few foster homes before finding the right fit. Her new owners moved to Sitka for the summer and started volunteering at the shelter with no intention of fostering or adopting. With Sitka's smaller population, they quickly realized it was quite difficult to find homes for the over 20 cats residing at the shelter. They decided to foster and wanted to take in whichever cat needed it the most, which was Maggie. Upon discovering that Maggie had experienced multiple homes, Maggie's new owners decided to make her a permanent part of their lives. Despite the initial challenge of earning her trust, their patience paid off, and Maggie has now become a part of their family. Her journey from shelter life to her new home has not only brought joy to her new owners but has also given her the stability and love she deserves. Maggie now lives happily with her new family in Texas.

### Murphy

At 10 weeks old, Murphy was hit by a car and while lucky that he survived, he ended up with fractures in two legs. Murphy was flown to Sitka where he was cared for and treated by local veterinarians. After surgery, he was taken in by the most amazing foster parents who helped nurse him back to health. It was a long road to recovery for Murphy, he was in a cast for three weeks and had to learn how to walk again. Murphy was fortunate that his foster parents had two dogs of their own that he could play with and learn from.

Murphy has since been adopted by a wonderful local family who love him very much. Murphy is full of energy and loves to run! While he doesn't have any fellow-canine brothers in his house, he does have two human brothers that he gets to play with.

We are grateful to our local veterinarians and the foster family who made sure Murphy got the care and socialization he needed to become the sweet and healthy pup he is today!

Beau and Oliver are brothers that both had a difficult time finding the right homes. As puppies, they were taken in by different families that unfortunately did not work out. Beau was the first to arrive to the shelter in May 2022. Beau was a sweet pup, but like most Coonhounds, Beau had a very loud voice and loved to pull, making him a little bit more difficult to adopt. Thankfully, the right family came along who was willing to take a chance on him and lucky for Beau it was the perfect fit! A year later, Beau's brother, Oliver, was surrendered to the shelter in April 2023 with similar behaviors to Beau - loud voice, pulling on a leash and overall fairly energetic. When Beau's family discovered that Oliver was available for adoption, they couldn't resist giving him a chance and re-uniting the brothers. Beau and Oliver now live happily with their humans and canine sister, Daisy, who keeps them on their best behavior! They love to play and take up as much space on the couch as possible.


#### Hannah Blanke

### MAKE A CONTRIBUTION

Where would you like your donation to go? We have two separate funds you can choose from.

- FOSAS General Fund: Donations to the General Fund cover a wide range of activities and services, all benefiting the lives of the animals at the shelter. Here are a few of the ways these funds are used:
  - Covering the cost of medical care for shelter pets that goes above and beyond the basic vaccinations and spay/neuter covered by the City of Sitka. This includes diagnostic testing such as x-rays and blood tests, care and treatment for chronic illnesses such as diabetes, and surgeries.
  - Renovating and improving shelter spaces to make them more enriching, vibrant and suitable for shelter animals while they await their forever home.
  - Sponsoring travel for shelter dogs to attend the Shelter Pet Obedience Training Program in Seward, Alaska where they are matched with an inmate and rehabilitated until they are adoptable. These are dogs that would otherwise be euthanized due to behavioral problems (read more on page 3).
- Compassionate Care Fund, in honor of Burgess Bauder: The Compassionate Care Fund was created just over a year ago by two Sitkan's, Tim and Julie Doggett, as a way to help low income families cover the cost of vet care. It can cover everything from vaccinations and spays/neuters to euthanasia or helping offset the cost of emergency visits. The Fund was named in honor of Burgess Bauder, one of Sitka's local veterinarians who has provided low-cost services to families for many years.
